Russell Daniel Carman: 1875-1926

Russell Daniel Carman was born in Iroquois, Ontario, March 18, 1875. At the age of 17, he moved with his mother to Butte, Montana and later to St. Paul. After some preliminary study in Minneapolis Academy, he took the first two years of the medical course at the University of Minnesota. He then moved to St. Louis, Missouri and completed his medical course at the Marion-Sims College of Medicine. He received the M.D. degree in 1901. After graduating from medical school, he worked for a year at Johns Hopkins Medical School and then returned to St. Louis to practice.

He had planned to specialize in orthopedics, but having a natural bent for the electrical arts, he was soon attracted to medical roentgenology which was then in its early stages of development. Keeping pace with its advances and devoting himself assiduously to the work, he soon became known as an exceedingly proficient and unusually reliable roentgenologist. He was made Professor of Roentgenology in the Medical School of St. Louis University and resigned later to accept the same post at Washington University. He was invited to join the staff of the Mayo Clinic, January 1, 1913 and became Head of the Section of Roentgenology, a position that he held at the time of his death. He died June 17, 1926 of carcinoma of the stomach.

Carman was best known for his work in the diagnosis of gastrointestinal disease. He worked in close association with the Doctors Mayo and W.C. MacCarty, pathologists at the Mayo Clinic. After an afternoon spent in fluoroscopy, he would follow the patient to operation and compare the roentgenologic and operative findings.

With Albert Miller, he wrote the classic textbook, *The Roentgen Diagnosis of Diseases of the Alimentary Canal*, published by W.B. Saunders Company, Philadelphia, 1917. He described "Carman's sign" as an indication of carcinoma of the stomach.

Carman held membership in many medical and roentgenological societies. He participated actively in their proceedings and was in frequent request to address other organizations. At the time of his death, he was President of the American Roentgen Ray Society.
